MINISTER'S LETTER Switch on Jesus. He is the reason for the Season

Isaiah 9:6 "unto us a child is born, a son is given and these will be his royal titles: Wonderful, Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace"

A while ago I was challenged for abbreviating Christmas as Xmas. The challenge was X in maths is used to represent an unknown factor and in common life it represents what has been. The contention was that Christ should be at the centre of Christmas. As I reflected further on that challenge I was reminded of the story of some kids who were putting on the Christmas play. To show the radiance of the newborn baby Christ, they put an electric light bulb hidden in the manger. All the stage lights were supposed to be turned off so that only the brightness of the manger could be seen. The kid who controlled the stage lights, however, got confused and all the lights went out. A very tense moment followed, broken only when one of the kids taking part as one of the shepherds in the play said in a loud stage whisper, "Hey, you switched off Jesus!"

This story is a constant cautious reminder of how easy it is in the confusion of consumerism and commercialism that surround Christmas, to switch off Christ who is the reason for the Season of Christmas, Christ the light of the world, the one who should be at the centre of Christmas and focus instead on the trappings that surround the celebration. Henry Nouwen, commenting on the modern world said, "We are on the move from false uncertainty, to true uncertainty". We live in a world most advanced technologically but still full of uncertainty. By switching off Christ, the only true source of light in a world that is like a moral maze, we certainly move into more uncertainty.

Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life and have it more abundantly" (John 10:10). In other passages of Holy Scriptures Jesus is referred to as both the morning and the evening star. As we approach the end of the year and stand on the dawn of the New Year may we switch onto Christ, the light of the world, to give us light in the dark moments of life? As we celebrate Christmas may we find God's kingdom in the new born King of Kings; righteousness in the Righteous One; Counsel in the prime Counsellor; wonder in the Wonderful One; salvation in the Saviour of the world and peace in the Prince of Peace.

I wish you all and yours a Happy Christmas and prosperous New Year.

WHAT'S IN THE NEWS (apart from Brexit and Donald Trump)?

At the end of the summer, Tanveer Ahmed, a Sunni Muslim, was sentenced to a long term in prison for the murder of Asad Shah, a Glasgow shopkeeper. After killing Mr Shah with a knife, Tanveer Ahmed gave himself up to the police. The murder was committed on religious grounds. Mr Shah had posted on Facebook the message, "Good Friday and a very happy Easter, especially to my beloved Christian nation."

In the words of the judge "This was a truly despicable crime motivated, it seems, by your sense of offence at a man's expression of his religious beliefs which differ from yours." Tanveer Ahmed had claimed that, "Asad Shah disrespected the messenger of Islam, the Prophet Muhammad, peace be upon him. Mr Shah claimed to be a prophet."

Asad Shah was a member of the Ahmadiyya faith, a Muslim sect known for its peaceful interfaith work. The sect's motto is "Love for all, hatred for none". The community was founded in 1889 in British-controlled northern India. It identifies itself as a Muslim movement, following the teachings of the Koran, and is claimed to have tens of millions of members across 206 countries. The sect moved its headquarters to the UK after a law in Pakistan banned its members from identifying themselves as Muslims and calling their places of worship mosques. It takes its name from its founder, Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, who was born in 1835 and was regarded by his followers as the messiah and a prophet. Ghulam Ahmad saw himself as a renewer and reformer of Islam and claimed to have been chosen by Allah.

All faiths have their divisions within them as well as from other faiths, but as we approach Christmas it is worth remembering that Jesus is recognized in Islam and revered as one of the prophets of Allah along with figures such as Abraham, David and Moses and John the Baptist. He and his mother, Mary, are referred to in several places in the Koran (see Surah III, 42-61). Currently, as we see so much bitterness and war between different branches of Islam and between some branches of Islam and Christianity it is worth remembering the message of Christmas of peace and goodwill and the values and beliefs that are common to both our faiths.

KEYS - A MEDITATION

Whenever we think of shut and locked doors, we also think of a key. But a key is not *only* a thing; it is also a powerful metaphor. We speak of the ' *key to the problem* ', the ' *key to understanding* ', and that finding such keys will help us to ' *unlock* ' solutions.

Reference to a key suggests that a barrier exists. A door is locked shut. For example, there is tension between a parent and child; we are baffled by a computer problem; relations between two countries continue to deteriorate. The solutions to the problems, whether small or global, seem blocked. What keeps us going is faith that there is a solution, if only we can find the right key, unlock the door, and remove the barrier.

But this is no easy matter. Keys are different and complicated, because locks are different and complicated. If locks are to be secure, the particular serrations which fit the correct key must be hidden away inside. Therefore making it difficult to find the right key.

Sometimes things feel like that. We reach for what to say to an angry spouse, friend or business colleague. What is needed? - more honesty? more tact? more self-assertion or less? more time apart or more togetherness? We flip through the keys, but cannot easily find the one which will release (open) the recalcitrant lock. Still we persist. If we are sincere in our efforts and consult with others, we stand a chance of finding the right key. When this happens it is magical. A tiny key slides into place, turns the bolt, releases the door, and opens up a new beginning.

Perhaps that key was as small as a moment of kindness; an admission of wrongdoing; an inspiration; a chance encounter; a heartfelt prayer. And lo, the door swings open; the barrier has disappeared.

So we must never despair. The forces that block and trouble us can seem to be as mighty as a fortress. By comparison, the forces of help seem small. And so they often are. But they are small like a key, and it can open the door and remove the barrier.

Last year members in the Whitley Bay Circuit in the North East of England knitted and handed out to people in the local community over 2000 angels. They were surprised and delighted by people's response and decided to share their experience with the wider Methodist Church.

Angela in the circuit office sent a copy of their email with pattern attached to the stewards at Lidgett and Val and Jennifer thought it might be nice to hand a knitted angel to every child using the church building. Val went round all the groups and we soon discovered that rather than the 150 children we had assumed used our building, there were close to 300 using the building every week.

So began our campaign to find Lidgett Park's knitters and so far 200 angels have been placed in the box provided for their deposit. Diza very kindly drew a growth chart which shows us 2/3rds of the way to our target.

We intend having a display of all the angels at the December coffee morning and they will be displayed in the church on the following Sunday. The angels will be handed over to the children when they come into the church to look at the Christmas decorations.

SONGS AND STORIES OF COURAGE AND CONSCIENCE

A large and very appreciative audience attended this event where Clive Barrett, Chair of the Bradford Peace Museum, enlightened us with facts, stories and information regarding the rise of the Conscience Objectors (CO's) and various other peace movements that sprang up during WW1 with emphasis on stories relating to some Yorkshire CO's.

The concert was interspersed with songs from the very melodious *Free Range Choir* led by the talented Frances Bernstein and the audience joined in with songs such as "It's a Long Way to Tipperary" and "The National Anthem" (peace version). A very moving rendering of a French song "La Chanson de Craonne" told of the grief suffered by soldiers in battle in the Craonne region where there was huge loss of life, and their growing opposition to the war.





Music played a vital role in the lives of CO's and the word "parting" occurs often in the songs as the men never knew when they would see each other again. With the death sentence hanging over them, men of conscience including those of religious faith, political activists and artists suffered terrible conditions of brutality, torture and imprisonment and opportunities for singing together lifted their spirits. Eighteen men were imprisoned in Richmond Castle and sixteen, including eight Leeds men were sent to France where

the death sentence awaited, later to be commuted to hard labour. Irish soldiers often faced treason charges after the war for supporting the British army.

Hearty thanks to Clive, Frances and the choir for a memorable time not forgetting our own band of ladies who nobly faced the throng to serve refreshments

At this time of year as we wear our poppies in remembrance of the fallen we may also give a

thought to those who died or suffered for their beliefs serving in the Front in non-combative roles or at home.

LIDGETT PARK METHODIST CHURCH 2022 VISION STATEMENT

Over the last 18 months, work has been continuing to develop a series of actions and initiatives to respond to a sense in the church that we have to change and keep moving forward as the needs of church members and the local community evolve. Examples of these initiatives are clearer and include more attractive notice boards, the new cross in the side entrance lobby, and the development of a new midweek space for reflection and worship.

However, questions have been raised continually by members about the overall future of the church looking ahead five to ten years, and the emerging sense that there needed to be a focus or vision to which everyone could sign up. Following a number of meetings and discussions, a small group representing most aspects of the Church's life has recently met and exchanged views on a new vision statement for the Church for the next 5 years. Such statement would be an overarching statement about what we are trying to achieve over this period, whilst being realistic about where we are and what is possible.

The proposed statement was presented to the Church Council in October and enthusiastically supported. This Is, therefore, the new vision statement for the church.

WHY ARE WE HERE?

The calling of the Methodist Church is to respond to the gospel of God's love in Christ and to live out its discipleship in worship and mission

PROPOSED VISION STATEMENT VISION 2022

The people of Lidgett Park Methodist Church believe that there continues to be an important need for a distinctive Methodist Christian community in the locality around Lidgett. They also believe that the vision for the next 5 years through to 2022 should be to maintain and expand the church's witness to the Christian faith through talking about Jesus to others, ensuring worship is attractive and meets the needs of both existing and potential new members, and by expanding further its mission and links with the community locally.

To support this vision we will:

Be welcoming and supportive of everyone (without judgment), and offer a welcome to all to join us in conversation, worship and other activities.

- 2 Be more open about talking about our faith (Sharing Jesus) with others with whom we have contact
- 3 Continue to develop and enhance our buildings to provide a welcoming, safe and flexible set of premises to be made available for church and community activities.
- 4 Build on our existing worship style and times, by considering additional forms of worship which may be more attractive or convenient for others in our community.
- 5 Encourage and develop our activities with children and young people, supporting those who use our premises in particular.
- 6 Enhance activities and pastoral support for those in our community who are elderly, sick or in need.
- 7 Encourage and help our church members and friends to learn about, and develop further, their faith in Jesus, and to provide opportunities for them to grow in Christian discipleship.
- 8 Be open and responsive in our dealings with the wider faith communities, and, in particular, to develop closer links and activities with our sister churches at St Andrews and St Edmunds.
- 9 Encourage, support further and play our part in the Methodist Circuit in North and East Leeds.

What happens next?

Although at first this may look similar to our existing aims and initiatives, a considered read again may indicate a need for change and response in areas such as worship, further development of our buildings, reaching out more to those who use our buildings, supporting more ecumenical and circuit activities and being bolder about talking about our faith.

The Church Council are keen for all members and friends to embrace these statements and to respond to them by personally getting involved in some new way (however small) to play a part in achieving this vision for 2022.

Over the next few months there may be new ideas and changes proposed in support of this vision. As we approach the New Year 2017, let us all consider how we can play a part in taking this forward.

LIDGETT PLACE ENTRANCE TO THE CHURCH

The main entrance to our church, although not the most used entrance, is off Lidgett Place. If you walk or drive past this entrance what do you see? Unless there is a service or concert going on in the church you will see three pairs of closed and locked solid wooden doors with little indication of what is behind them. Many other churches have done something to open up the front of their churches.

The vision statement for the Church agreed at the last Church Council includes the statement that 'we will continue to develop and enhance our buildings to provide a welcoming, safe and flexible set of premises to be made available for church and

community activities'

The Church Stewards and members of the Finance and Property Committees agreed to appoint an architect to advise us on how we could open up the Lidgett Place entrance to the church and provide toilets at the back of the church. We now have a plan which provides this, glazed doors in the centre with glazed windows to the sides, the removal of the first screen to open up the front lobby and allow a view into the church and two toilets in the store on the left side of the lobby. The cost of this work is likely to be between £40,000 and £50,000. This will make the front entrance to the church more welcoming and will be particularly suitable for events when most people do come in through the front entrance of the church (weddings, funerals and concerts)

Church Council has agreed that we should take this further. This means working up the scheme in more detail, looking at the various approvals that will be required, and considering what grants we might be able to apply for. There is £6000 that we could use from money available to the Church but it will inevitably mean that we will have to think about ways of local fund-raising as many grants will be dependent on matched local funds.
